Technical Articles

How to read and reset diagnostic codes on the C5 Corvette “Digital Instrument Cluster (DIC)”

A very thorough explanation on reading and clearing diagnostic codes on the DIC is provided on pages 68 and 69 of the 1997 – 2004 Corvette Operations Manual & Performance Verification Test Guide. I have provided a condensed version below:



The C5 Corvette has the ability for users to pull any stored engine codes from the DIC on their dash. Users can also navigate the code(s) stored by the system, see the state of the code, and reset codes if they choose. It's user friendly and incredibly useful, but there are a few tricks to know.

Let's start by how to pull the codes.

1. Turn the ignition to the "On" position without starting the engine
2. Use the "Reset" button to clear any DIC messages such as "door ajar" or any other such warning.
3. Press and hold the "Options" (4) button while simultaneously pressing the "Fuel" (#1) button four times.

This will cause the dashboard to start to cycle through all of the codes stored in the car; the system cycles through quickly, but you can navigate the individual systems after the cycle is complete.

IMPORTANT DETAIL: Codes will display, along with an "H", and possibly a "C". These are important to note, as "H" means history, while "C" means current. Another way to think about it is that "H" means you HAD a problem, and "C" means you HAVE a problem.

After the DIC has displayed all of modules, the system goes into manual mode, which allows navigation of each module. The manual mode can also be entered during the initial full code output by pressing any button except "E/M". Once the DIC displays "manual diagnostics", you can select a module by pressing the "Options" button to go forward a system or the "Trip"

button to go back a system. Once a system is selected, the DIC will output if there are any stored codes. Users can then press the “Gauges” button to move forward through the codes or the “Fuel” button to go back.

If you want to erase or clear codes, you can do so for either an individual code stored in a module, or for all the codes stored in that module. What is cleared depends solely on what you see on the DIC, if a module is displayed - it'll clear all codes in the module, and if an individual code is displayed - it will clear only that code. So, once you've got what you want to clear displayed on your DIC, you will press and hold reset until the car beeps, at which time the code will attempt to have been cleared.

IMPORTANT DETAIL: Clearing a code does not repair anything, and if the code has a C, it will most certainly be coming back.

Lastly, to exit the diagnostic mode at any time, press the E/M button.

C4 Power Window Motor Repair

On a recent bright Sunday morning, I drove my '93 Corvette to a local car show and discovered that my passenger window would only move approximately 1/2" and then no further movement – except after turning the key off and then back on, at which time it would go another 1/2". After checking the fuses, electrical connections and switches, the window would go down and up but would not go back up once it went all the way down - hmm.

I won't go through the procedure to dismantle the door to get at the motor as there are some good tutorials on the internet. In anticipation of replacing the motor, a new window motor was ordered. When the wrong motor arrived, I decided to jump in and see if the original motor was repairable. I found that the screws on the bottom plate of the motor were loose and there was corrosion. The corrosion was at one of the springs that pushes the brush against the armature and there was no pressure to push the brush against the armature.



I found a used brush/spring assembly on the internet for \$11. After replacing the corroded spring and reassembly, the motor works great.

The point is that repairing an electric window motor for the C4 is simple once you have the panel off and have removed the regulator assembly. In this case, the self-repair is cheaper than the cost of a complete assembly (\$237) or replacing the motor (\$71) and having to drill out the rivets.
